Concept: To recreate the Butterfield stage line as a regional recreational trail

Much of the history of Temescal Valley centers around a trail, which centuries ago ran through the area along the route historians have identified as today's Temescal Canyon Road.

Old Temescal Road, also known as the Southern Emigrant Trail, played a major role in California history. It was the route used by the Luiseno and Gabrieleno Native Americans to reach their nearby villages. Leandro Serrano, the first nonnative settler in Riverside County, built a home near the trail in 1820. Gold seekers, including John Fremont, used the road from 1849 to 1851, and it was the route for the Butterfield Overland Mail coaches, which made round-trips between St. Louis, Mo. and San Francisco from 1858 to 1861.

The National Park Service in 2009 began a U.S. Congress-endorsed study to include the Butterfield Overland stage route in the National Historic Trails system, recreating the route through a series of recreational trails connecting between St. Louis and San Francisco. Many of the original stagecoach routes have disappeared, and urbanization – freeways and homes, now sit where the original trails once rambled. The recreational trail route – for hikers, bikers and equestrians, is required to follow as closely as possible the original stage route, but when not feasible, can be relocated nearby to enhance the trail-user's experience.

Riverside County became involved in the project in 2013. The county has long-envisioned a trail system for its western area that would connect all regional trails, from Temecula on the south to the 120-mile Santa River Trail on the north.

A project planning team was assembled, led by Temescal Valley resident **Amie Kinne** and **Jeff Greene**, county **Supervisor Kevin Jeffries**' chief of staff. Kinne is chairwoman of the county's Trails Committee and a district advisory commissioner for the county's Parks and Open Space District. Also on the team are **Marc Brewer** and **Brian Shomo**, with the county's Parks and Open Space department and the Habitat Conservation Agency, respectively, and representatives from the cities of Corona and Lake Elsinore. The National Parks Service lent the expertise of employee **Patrick Johnston** to the team.

Over the past two years, hours upon hours have been spent scouting Temescal Valley terrain east of the I-15 for possible trail alignments that incorporate open-space vistas and historical landmarks. Trail alignments also were explored in the cities of Lake Elsinore and Corona. Most of the proposed alignments currently are on private property.

With little or no money in the county budget to create new trails, it's suggested that when definite alignments are selected, property owners will give the county easements or will be required to donate the land as a mitigating condition of approval when the owner seeks to develop the property.

The team has documented its Butterfield Trail concept in a multi-page report that now is being presented to the public. It soon will be available on the county's website and eventually presented to the Board of Supervisors for approval.

NEW BUILDING TO BRING 150 JOBS ... A 64,000-plus-square-foot building was approved by the county Board of Supervisors at its Oct. 6 meeting. The building will be constructed on 13 acres at the southern end of the Wildrose Business Park on Temescal Canyon Road. Plans call for 36,290 square feet of manufacturing, 22,000 square feet of warehouse and 5,900 square feet of office space. There will be 125 parking spaces. According to **Darrell Clendenen**, the project's applicant, he plans to begin construction on curbs, qutters and sidewalks by the end of the year.

DELEO GROWS BY 13 ACRES ... The county recently finalized the purchase of 13 acres adjacent to **Deleo Regional Sports Park**. The purchase of the property by the county was part of the original agreement with the developer of Sycamore Creek. While suggestions have been made on the best use of this recreational land – everything from an aquatic center to a community garden or BMX park, improvements will have to wait until county funds become available.
